Parental Overinvolvement

- What is going on
 - Manage details of child's life
 - Especially school and sports
 - Emotional investment in child's outcome
- Whv?
 - Varied family structures lead to parents who want stability for child – protection
 - Cultural environment of parents who are involved, overprotective, & child-focused
 - Digital connections considered normal

Results of Hovering

- Lower quality parent-child communication
 - Leads to lower family satisfaction
- Parent anxiety leads to anxiety in children
 - Parental control seen as evidence of fearful situation
- Children are less emotionally stable
 - External locus of control
- Young adults exhibit entitlement

The Effect on Schooling

- Focus is on results not on process
 - Both students and parents
 - High stakes testing only complicates
- Control of curriculum shifts from school to parents
- As homework becomes more complicated, parents become more involved and less effective

Parental Concerns with Homework

- "Busywork"
- Too little information on what parents are to do
 - Assumption that parents are to be involved
- Frustration and/or embarrassment at not understanding directions or having the skills to help
 - If not busywork, then the homework is too hard
 - SES/cultural differences

How Homework is Evaluated

- Students, parents and teachers believe homework will help students
- 26% of students, 24% of teachers, and 40% of parents think it is "busywork"
- 29% of teachers report homework is a "major source of stress"
- Parental involvement more positive factor than SES is a negative factor
- Primarily mother's involvement

Purpose of Homework?

- 3 types
 - Practice, Preparation, and Integration (includes long-term work)
- 4 types
 - Memorization of rules, etc., increase skill speed, deepening understanding of a concept, preparation for following day's learning
- Does it work?
 - Gains for students who complete homework are between 8% and 31%

How Schools can Control the Homework Process

- Communicate goals and expectations
 - To parents and students
- Develop methods which require parental guidance, not knowledge
- Offer help to parents in developing skills

Partnership Homework

- Regular part of the programme
- Read together focus on activities
- involve parents in classroom activities, give parents voice in decisions, genuine effort to reach out to parents
- Link schoolwork with real-life situations
- Show, share, talk
- homework sheet
- Very clear when homework is to be solo

Teachers Involve Parents in Schoolwork

- Homework is student's responsibility, parents are supportive
- With family, students demonstrate maths skills, conduct science experiments, share ideas and obtain reactions to written work, conduct surveys or interviews, gather family memories, apply school skills to real life

TIPS Process

- Orientation of families
- TIPS activities go home regularly
- Extra time given to ensure family participation
- Assignment no longer than two sides of one page in simple language
- Use readily available materials at no or minimal cost
- Include communication from home to teacher about the exercise
- Treated the same as other homework

Include Parents in Homework

- Overinvolvement is not healthy for children
- Helping parents develop proper involvement helps children learn
- Include parents as part of the process by:
 - Providing instruction for parents
 - Use of rubrics, check sheets
 - Feedback both from home and from school
 - Integral part of programme
